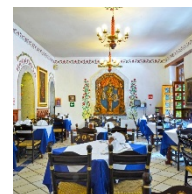

Day 1 **Ciudad de México** **Hampton Inn & Suites by Hilton *** (****)**
Thursday, 29. January 2026

The Café de Tacuba restaurant was inaugurated in 1912 in the heart of Mexico City near the Plaza de la Constitución and is now part of the traditional gastronomy of Mexico City. Enjoy the typical Mexican home cuisine in cosy atmosphere. (The visit to the restaurant Restaurant Café de Tacuba includes Dinner) Water included.

Mexico City is the life and soul of the country politically, socially and culturally and features numerous universities, museums and



monuments. On a tour through the center of the metropolis, you pass by the presidential palace, stroll through the huge Zócalo and visit the Catedral Metropolitana de la Asunción de María de la Ciudad de México, the oldest and mightiest cathedral in the Americas. Surrounded by the snow-covered twin volcanoes of Popocatepetl and Iztaccíhuatl, more than 25 million people are today living in the Valle de México metropolitan area.

The Museo Nacional de Antropología is the most frequented museum in Mexico. It has 12 exhibition halls, each dedicated to a different pre-Columbian civilization and which total an area of nearly 80,000-m² (nearly 20-acres). Designed in 1964 by a team led by architect Pedro Ramírez Vázquez, the monumental construction impresses its visitors especially with a mighty pillar in the patio that supports a huge concrete umbrella. Discover the civilizations of the Olmec, Toltec, Aztecs and Maya, among many others. **I requested that the guide choose 2 of the areas and do an in-depth talk about those civilizations.**



Chapultepec Castle, the only North American castle that was also used as a residence - by Emperor Maximilian I - today houses the National Museum of History. Its rich collections from several centuries include, e.g., clothes, antique furniture, coins, paintings, and countless documents of the Mexican history.

You visit the impressive Chapultepec Park. Formerly, the area was completely overgrown with forest and a sacred place of the Aztecs. Today it is a green oasis amidst the capital with old, shady trees, idyllic lakes, a sculpture garden, several museums and monuments (such as the Altar a la Patria in memory of the Niños Héroes), a zoo, and beautiful market stalls.



The Balcón del Zócalo restaurant is located in the heart of Mexico City, opposite the Presidential Palace and the largest cathedral on the continent. Under the leadership of chef José Antonio Salinas, affectionately known as Chef Pepe, the cuisine presents itself with idiosyncratic and exciting creations that find their roots in the diversity of the metropolitan region and Mexican cooking tradition. (The restaurant Restaurant Balcón del Zócalo includes Dinner. Water included)

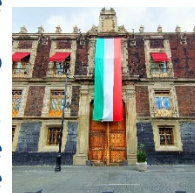

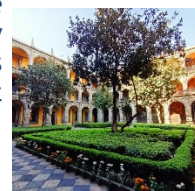

You visit the Museo Vivo del Muralismo with murals that were painted by Diego Rivera and substantially contributed to his success. Between March 1923 and September 1928, Rivera decorated the two large patios of the neocolonial building with numerous frescos, which cover a total area of more than 1,500-m² (about 17,000-sq.ft.). He called those courtyards “Patio del Trabajo” and “Patio de las Fiestas.” The subjects include the passion of Christ, battle scenes of the Mexican Revolution, traditions of the people, and landscapes. Particularly remarkable are the representations of Cuauhtémoc, Felipe Carrillo Puerto, Emiliano Zapata, and Otilio Montaña.



You visit the museum Antiguo Colegio de San Ildefonso in the historic center of Mexico City. The Baroque building from the early 18th century was one of the most important educational institutions in the Mexican capital for many years. Since the early 1990s, it



accommodates a museum with permanent and temporary exhibitions that has become increasingly popular. On your tour, you see wall paintings by various artists, e.g., Clemente Orozco and Fernando Leal as well as one of the first murals by Diego Rivera and many other exhibits of modern and contemporary art.

Of course you will already know the story of how LeoTrotski was murdered by one of Stalin's agents with an ice pick. Today, you can get to know the place where it happened. Many objects have been left in the place where they were found on the day of the attack, and this allows you to get a snapshot of that moment of history and of his strong relationship with Mexico.



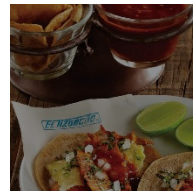
Probably the most famous building in the in borough of Coyoacán is the cobalt blue house in Calle Londres 247. It was artist Frida Kahlo's home. In accordance with what she had wished in her lifetime, the Casa Azul became a museum after her death in 1954. The exhibits include personal belongings, books, photos, clothes, and much more. The courtyard of the house accommodates Frida's wonderful garden.

The San Angel Inn is located on a former hacienda that dates to 1692. Just a few steps from the Diego Rivera y Frida Kahlo museum, you are served exquisite cuisine. Think about giving a try to "Carne asada a la Mexicana" or - still more typically Mexican - "Crepas de huitlacoche".

Walk around Colonia Condesa. Wide, tree-lined streets, imposing Art Nouveau mansions and well-preserved Art Deco apartment buildings give the chic La Condesa neighborhood an European flair. There are stylish street cafés, trendy international bistros and cosy taquerias throughout the district.

Located in the picturesque Condesa district, the Tizoncito Tamaulipas Taquería is a true paradise for local and foreign taco lovers. Founded in 1966 by Doña Conchita the small restaurant can be found on the street corner of Tamaulipas and Campeche. Upon the special charcoal grill - "Horno de Pastor" - the meat is grilled and pineapple juice is poured over it to provide the dishes with a bittersweet, even exotic, Mexican touch. The simple bar tables and stools are always clean and bring the culinary experience to the fore. The classic Tacos al Pastor, along with the Pozole, Tacos de Bola and the Chilaquiles de frijoles con pastor, are worthy of forgetting your diet.

Day 4

Ciudad de México

Sunday, 01. February 2026

Ciudad de México - Teotihuacán (Journey / 49.0 km / 70 Min.)

Visit of the huge pyramid complex of Teotihuacán. It was the first city in the "New World." Built between 250 BC and 700 AD, its population, in its heyday, amounted to approximately 125,000 - 250,000 people in about 2,300 apartment complexes; at that time, it certainly was the largest metropolis on the American continent.



Only when you walk along the mighty “Avenue of the Dead” (about 1 km long) will you become aware of the dimensions of the site. The excavations, which have been executed for many years and are still systematically continued, expand our knowledge of this past civilization every day. Return Transfer at 13.00 hrs. There are restaurants near the hotel so you will have time for optional lunch before the transfer to Ixtapan.
